
AWAY IN A MANGER PAUL SJOLUND







ABOUT OUR CHRISTMAS MUSIC

Merry Christmas from all of us at the Cathedral of St. Paul! We hope you and your family have a wonderful Christmas season and will return to worship with us often. From the very beginning of the liturgy at the entrance antiphon and in all the chant antiphons, Jesus' divine sonship is clearly the reason for this day. It seems at times that, as the introit's versicle sings, the whole world is engaged in vain struggles. It is very appropriate to view this entire liturgy through the lens of "peace on earth". The focus of this year's prelude is very much on Christmas carols: we hope you enjoy some favorites and perhaps make some new ones! Paul Sjolund's setting of "Away in a manger" was commissioned by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, but lends itself to groups of all sizes, and has a beautiful violin solo. Robert Parsons' incredibly beautiful setting of the Ave Maria is set for five voices: the elegant polyphony is also very intricate: each soprano entry is one step higher, perhaps portraying stairs to heaven in honor of Our Lady's Assumption. A final Amen is one of the most thrilling conclusions in Renaissance polyphony. The two instrumental presentations tonight are both from the Baroque, but from very different places: Bach's Concerto in c is derived from the same piece scored for two harpsichords. It was written prior to Bach's move to Leipzig as cantor at the Thomaskirche; rather, as kappelmeister at a princely court, he had the luxury of very talented instrumental collaborators—along with a boss who had relatively little need for religious music. Many of Bach's greatest chamber works date from this period. We hope you enjoy this example, here played by two violins rather than the more typical violin and oboe. Across the present-day border, we encounter the very different music of Louis-Claude Daquin. A child prodigy from a family of very learned Italian immigrants, Daquin rapidly ascended to the highest heights of French organists, becoming organist to Louis XV in 1739 and organiste titulaire at Notre-Dame-de-Paris in 1755. He is mostly known today for these phenomenal noëls, which neatly encapsulate much of the "French Classical" organ school of the 17th and 18th Century. Our pipe organ is especially designed for this repertoire, so enjoy this little trip to Paris! Tonight's Mass ordinary is a famous example of a genre we have not yet presented here at the Cathedral: the *Pastoralmesse*. As the German name implies, it is a style that recalls a bucolic countryside, quiet fields, and a general escape from the concerns of the city: in short, where we would've found the shepherds at the Nativity. As already noted, this mood of peace is implied in many of the liturgical texts of the Christmas Mass. Musically speaking, it means a focus on 6/8 meter, harmony in parallel thirds for the trebles, and a semi-drone theme of parallel fifths for the men that recalls bagpipes. Americans may have heard this style in Schübert's Mass in G, but we seldom hear this German Romantic genre otherwise in the US. The focus is on beautiful vocal lines, not on technical virtuosity: we are, in effect, helping calm the little Lord Jesus! Ignaz Reimann was born in Albendorf, Silesia (present-day Wambierzyce, Poland), a tiny town dominated by a huge Marian shrine church built in the 18th Century. Here we see Reimann writing what he knew from rural life! The Christkindlmesse is so known because of its ubiquity (to this day) around Christmas in German Catholic churches, most notably Cologne Cathedral. The Kyrie presents the initial themes of the piece, which recur in the Credo's "et incarnatus" and in an altered, 4/4 form in the Sanctus, returning to pastoral 6/8 in the Benedictus. The Gloria is set in a triumphant style (recalling the announcement of the angels to the shepherds in the fields) that briefly recurs in the Sanctus, too. The Agnus Dei is rather stormy at the beginning, perhaps painting the picture of Herod's murderous designs toward Our Infant Lord. Peace returns in the form of the initial 6/8 Kyrie theme, though, when we hear "dona nobis pacem/grant us peace". Mass ends with Michael Dell's clever combination of "Joy to the world" with figuration from Mulet's "Tu es petrus". Merry Christmas!
